2023

Settlement Agreement closes December 31, 2023 2022

Leadership changes result in 2nd extension through December 2023 2020

Many elements of the Settlement Agreement extended due to COVID



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



Heat Preparedness Workshops

- Conducted 17 workshops at DC Senior Wellness Centers & Senior Village Sites from mid-August to mid-September 2024
- Approx. 450 older adults attended these workshops
- Three (3) workshops were conducted in Spanish with a certified interpreter present
- Distributed over 500 cool kits, as well as heat preparedness flyers & magnets



Cool Kits

Cool Kits include:

- Water
- Cooling towels
- Cold packs
- Electrolyte mix
- Sunscreen
- Cooler

Lesson Learned and Community Experiences

Lessons Learned

More visuals and less text on flyers

Do not assume capability of audience

Offer interpreters in other languages besides Spanish

Offer in other facilities, such as Assisted Living Facilities, skilled nursing facilities, etc.

Procure more reusable cool kits

Conduct earlier in the summer

Everyone loves snacks!

Concern about climate change in DC and how important this information is, especially to seniors aging from home (unable to travel to workshop sites)

Community Corner Lots of people shared how they did not know the difference between heat exhaustion/heat stroke and how to respond to each

People really appreciated the senior centers/cooling centers as spaces to socialize when it is too hot to be outside

Maurice Barnes is an incredibly talented illustrator and artist.


A DC-native, his preferred medium is colored pencils, and he brings a kind and joyful spirit to his work and to the studio.


Outside of the studio, Maurice loves spending time with his family.


