Quality Affordable Health Insurance is Available to you!

In August of 2012, Mayor Vincent C. Gray established the DC Heath Benefit Exchange Authority to implement President Obama's new health care law. The bill, which is known as the Affordable Care Act (ACA), was signed into law March 23, 2010 and as a result, thousands of District residents, small business owners, and their employees will soon have access to comprehensive, affordable health coverage. Many individuals and families will also qualify for help paying for health insurance premiums.

As a national leader in fulfilling the promise of the health care law, the District of Columbia through its DC Health Benefit Exchange (HBX) is building a new online marketplace – called DC Health Link – for District residents and small businesses to get the facts about their rights and benefits, shop for coverage, and compare options side-by-side before choosing the plan that best meets their needs and budgets. Residents will begin to enroll in the health plan of their choice on October 1, 2013, with coverage starting January 1, 2014.

To learn more about DC Health Link and the affordable, high-quality health insurance options offered, as well as new Medicaid options, please mark your calendar to attend one of the DC Health Link Ward Town Hall meetings. <u>Presidential Proclamation on the 23rd Anniversary of the Americans with Disabilities Act</u> Proclamation by President Barack Obama on the 23rd anniversary of the <u>Americans with Disabilities Act</u> (ADA). The ADA protects the rights of Americans with disabilities and breaks down barriers to provide more opportunities for people with disabilities in their community, at work and where they live. The Administration is working to level the playing field for Americans with disabilities by recruiting, hiring and retaining workers with disabilities.

Social Security's Ticket to Work: Free Support Services for People with a Disability Who Are Ready to Work - August 7 If you receive Social Security disability benefits and want to make more money through work, Social Security's <u>Ticket to Work</u> (TTW) program can help. Register for this free Work Incentives Seminar Event that will be held on **August 7, 2013,** from 3 – 4:30 p.m. Eastern Time. You'll learn about the TTW and how other <u>work incentives</u> may let you keep your benefits while you explore employment or receive vocational rehabilitation services. <u>Justice Department Sues Florida Doctor, Medical Practice for Retaliating against Deaf Couple</u> The U.S. Department of Justice has filed a lawsuit against Dr. Hal Brown and Primary Care of the Treasure Coast of Vero Beach, FL for violating the <u>Americans with Disabilities Act</u> (ADA). The doctor and the practice allegedly refused to continue to treat a deaf couple after learning that they had filed a lawsuit against a

hospital for not providing sign language interpreter services. It violates the ADA to retaliate against individuals exercising their rights under the law.

<u>People with Diabetes May Face Higher Disability Risk</u> A recent study in "The Lancet Diabetes and Endocrinology" finds that people with <u>diabetes</u> face more than a 50 percent higher risk of disability than people without the disease. The odds of someone with diabetes having a mobility disability, such as trouble walking, were 71 percent higher than for someone without diabetes. The study highlights the importance of focusing on disease prevention, early diagnosis and treatment of diabetes.

<u>Justice Department Sues Florida for Segregating Children with Disabilities</u> The U.S. Department of Justice has filed a lawsuit against the state of Florida for allegedly violating the <u>Americans with Disabilities Act</u> (ADA). Under Florida's service system, children with significant medical needs are provided services in nursing facilities when they could be served in their family's homes or in community settings. The ADA and the Supreme Court's decision in <u>Olmstead v. L.C.</u> requires states to stop unnecessary segregation of persons with disabilities.

<u>Report Reviews Impact of 2008 Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) Amendments Act</u> The National Council on Disability's new report <u>"A Promising Start: Preliminary Analysis of Court Decisions Under the</u> <u>ADA Amendments Act,"</u> reviews the court decisions that have been made under the <u>ADA Amendments Act</u> of 2008. The report shows that there have been significant improvements in how courts are interpreting protections under the ADA.

U.S. Access Board Releases New Guidance on Making Prescription Drug Container Labels Accessible The U.S. Access Board has released new guidance on how to make prescription drug container labels accessible to people with vision impairments or who are elderly. The information on drug container labels is often inaccessible to people who can't read print or small type, including dosage, side effects and expiration dates. The guidance covers different ways of making labels accessible, including Braille, large print, auditory technologies such as "talking bottles" and radio frequency identification tags.

Power Grid Operator Company Settles Lawsuit for Denying Reasonable Accommodation to Employee with Postpartum Depression The U.S. Equal Employment Opportunity Commission has charged Midcontinent Independent Transmission System Operator with <u>disability discrimination</u> under the <u>Americans with</u> Disabilities Act (ADA). An employee at the Carmel, IN office had postpartum depression and requested a reasonable accommodation of leave. Her request was denied and she was then fired her for lack of attendance. The company has agreed to train its employees on the obligations under the ADA.

Justice Department Settles Lawsuit with Erie County, NY for Discriminating against Employee with Vision Disability The U.S. Department of Justice has settled a lawsuit against Erie County, NY for violating the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) by discriminating against an employee with a vision impairment. The county allegedly refused to promote an employee with monocular vision because he did not have a commercial driver's license, even though other employees without a commercial driver's license had been promoted.
