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HUD ISSUES NEW GUIDANCE TO ENCOURAGE PARTICIPATION IN STATE EFFORTS TO ASSIST INDIVIDUALS MOVING OUT OF INSTITUTIONS AND INTO HOUSING

The U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) today issued new guidance to HUD-assisted housing providers on how they can support state and local *Olmstead* efforts to increase the integrated housing opportunities for individuals with disabilities who are transitioning from, or at serious risk of entering, institutions and other restrictive, segregated settings.

Olmstead refers to the 1999 Supreme Court landmark decision, Olmstead v. L.C., which affirmed that the unjustified segregation of individuals with disabilities is an illegal form of discrimination. Following the Olmstead decision, many states are working hard to assist individuals living in institutions and other segregated settings to move to integrated, community-based settings where they can receive the health care and long-term services and supports they need. Many of these efforts, though, are confounded by a lack of integrated and affordable housing options for persons with disabilities.

HUD's new guidance encourages public housing agencies and other HUD-assisted housing providers to consider the housing needs of their individual communities and their state and to partner with state and local governments to provide additional community-based, integrated housing opportunities. HUD's guidance is consistent with efforts across federal agencies and in many states to provide appropriate health care and related supportive services for individuals with disabilities in the most integrated setting appropriate to their needs.

"There is a tremendous need for affordable housing where individuals with disabilities are able to live and be part of the very fabric of their communities," said HUD Secretary Shaun Donovan. "HUD is committed to offering housing options that enable individuals with disabilities to live in the most integrated settings possible and to fully participate in community life."

The guidance announced today affirms HUD's commitment that individuals with disabilities, like all persons, should have meaningful choice and self-determination in housing and in the health care and related support services they receive. For this reason, HUD is exploring how it can fund additional integrated housing units scattered throughout communities and provide a greater range of meaningful housing choices for individuals with disabilities. HUD is also exploring how existing HUD-assisted housing can provide individuals with disabilities increased opportunities to exercise autonomy, independence, and self-determination in living arrangements that have the comforts and qualities of home. DDOT Releases State Management Plan for Section 5310 Capital Assistance Program
The District Department of Transportation (DDOT), through the U.S. Department of Transportation
Federal Transit Administration's Section 5310 program, provides financial assistance to Districtbased organizations to purchase vehicles and wheelchair equipment to help meet the
transportation needs of elderly persons and persons with disabilities when existing transportation
services are unavailable to meet their needs. DDOT ensures that local applicants and project
activities are eligible and in compliance with federal requirements.

DDOT prepared the District of Columbia's State Management Plan, Section 5310 Capital Assistance Program document to ensure that its administration of the Section 5310 program:

- is in compliance with the federal and the District of Columbia's regulations;
- provides administrative and programmatic guidance to grantees; and
- facilitates the accomplishment of federal and District goals.

A copy of the State Management Plan will be available for review at the Martin Luther King, Jr. Library at 901 G Street NW and at the DDOT's headquarters at 55 M Street SE, Suite 400. The plan can also be reviewed online at www.ddot.dc.gov/5310.

Supreme Court Refuses to Review Disability Discrimination Lawsuit against United Airlines The U.S. Supreme Court denied United Airlines' request to review a disability discrimination lawsuit brought by the U.S. Equal Employment Opportunity Commission (EEOC). The EEOC had charged United with allegedly violating the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) by requiring workers with disabilities to compete for vacant positions, which usually resulted in job loss. The Seventh Circuit Court of Appeal's earlier ruling stood that under the ADA, employers must provide reasonable accommodations to employees with disabilities, which includes reassignment to open positions.

Federal Agencies Partner to Expand Mental Health Services for Veterans, Service Members & Families The U.S. Departments of Veterans Affairs (VA), Defense and Health and Human Services have released a <u>report</u> on their progress on initiatives in the <u>Executive Order</u> to Improve Access to Mental Health Services for Veterans, Service Members and Military Families. These federal departments have been working to increase the capacity of the <u>Veterans Crisis Line</u> by 50 percent; hiring more providers for VA <u>mental health services</u>; and implementing a suicide prevention campaign.

Labor Department Announces Theme for National Disability Employment Awareness Month (NDEAM) 2013 The U.S. Department of Labor's Office of Disability Employment Policy (ODEP) has announced that the theme for this October's NDEAM will be "Because We Are EQUAL to the Task". The theme reflects the fact that people with disabilities indeed have the education, training, experience and desire to succeed in the workplace. This year's theme also ties in with ODEP's Campaign for Disability Employment to promote employment success for people with disabilities.

Study Finds Average Rent Cost Higher Than Entire Monthly SSI Payment of Many with Disabilities The Technical Assistance Collaborative and the Consortium for Citizens with Disabilities have released a study, "Priced Out in 2012," which finds that the national average rent for a reasonably priced one-bedroom apartment is more than the entire Supplemental Security Income (SSI) benefit of a person with a disability. The study shows that people with disabilities receiving SSI need to pay 104 percent of their income to rent a one-bedroom apartment.

New CDC Report Finds One Out of Five Children Experience a Mental Disorder A new report from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, "Mental Health Surveillance Among Children—United States, 2005–2011", for the first time describes public efforts on monitoring children ages 3-17 who have specific mental disorders. The report finds that 13-20 percent of children living in the United States (up to one out of five children) experience a mental disorder in a given year with an estimated \$247 billion spent on treatment.

FCC Adopts Rules to Help Consumers During Transition to Text-to-911 The Federal Communications Commission (FCC) has released a Report and Order requiring wireless carriers and providers of interconnected text messaging to send a "bounce back" message to consumers who try to text 911 where text-to-911 is not available. The new requirement will help consumers who text 911 whether or not the 911 authorities received the text message. The bounce-back messaging capability will be implemented by June 13, 2013.

Board of Education Settles Lawsuit for Firing Employee Caring for Sick Parent The Putnam County Board of Education in Winfield, WV has agreed to settle a lawsuit for allegedly violating the Family and Medical Leave Act (FMLA). The school board fired an employee who had requested time off to care for a parent with a serious health condition. The board has since agreed to comply with the FMLA.

<u>Passenger with Service Animal to Ride in Separate Van</u> The U.S. Department of Justice has reached a <u>settlement agreement</u> with SuperShuttle to resolve a complaint that the company discriminated against an individual who is blind. The Arizona-based company violated the <u>Americans with Disabilities Act</u> (ADA) by forcing a blind individual who uses a service animal to ride in a separate van and charging a higher fare. SuperShuttle has agreed to train its staff on the ADA.
