The Summary highlights each agency's quantitative goal (the number of individuals it expects to help transition into the community during this fiscal year) as well as its qualitative goal (how it expects to promote community integration and inclusion through technical assistance, agency collaboration, and community outreach).

The agencies participating in the District's Community Integration Plan are: Office of the State Superintendent for Education (OSSE), Office on Aging (DCOA), Department of Youth Rehabilitation Services (DYRS), Department of Disability Services (DDS), Department of Human Services (DHS), Department of Mental Health (DMH), Child and Family Services Agency (CFSA), DC Public Schools (DCPS) and the Department of Health Care Finance (DHCF). Upcoming Election Center Accessible Voting Workshop Seminars

Election Center Accessible Voting Workshop Seminars

The Election Center is conducting six accessible voting workshop seminars to help election jurisdictions of all sizes to prepare for an anticipated rise in the number of voters with disabilities. Each day-long session will have the same content. A coalition of accessibility groups and The Election Center formed the Research Alliance for Accessible Voting (RAAV) to study these issues and now that the grant is concluding, they have results that can be shared with election administrators to prepare for both the present and the future. Schedule: Chicago (Nov 12); San Francisco (Jan 30); St. Louis (Feb 13); Seattle (March 7); Washington, DC (March 18); Minneapolis (April 10). Justice Department Settles with Rite Aid over Discrimination against Customer with HIV



How to File an ADA Complaint with the U.S. Department of Justice

The U.S. Department of Justice has reached a settlement with Rite Aid of Okemos, MI over claims of disability discrimination under the <u>Americans with Disabilities Act</u> (ADA). A Rite Aid pharmacist discriminated against a customer with HIV by refusing to give him a flu shot without using "special" gloves. Under the settlement, Rite Aid must train its staff on the ADA.
